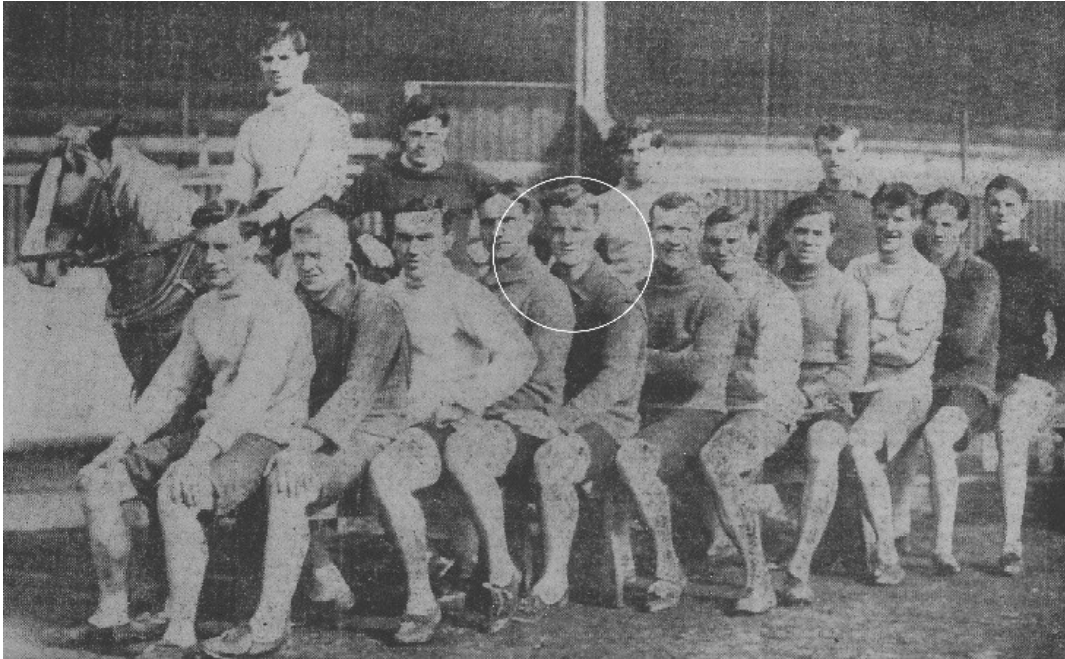
Played for the Army Ordnance Corps in the West Kent League and played alongside Spreadbury, another future Robin
In his first spell at Southampton, he played just one game for the Reserves and scored a hat trick
Apparently joined Southampton in 1912 as a temporary measure before emigrating to South Africa - but didn't go
Played for Bromley in the Kent League and the Kent Senior Shield
Was cup-tied when he joined the Common as he played for Bromley in a 3-3 draw away at Dartford on Saturday 12.10.1912 in the F.A. Cup 1st. Qualifying Round, scoring twice
Scored twice on his Croydon Common debut and appeared for the club in 5 minor cup matches, scoring 2 goals
The 1911 Census records him as a storeman with the Royal West Kent Regiment at Red Barracks, Henry Street, Woolwich
Gained Southern Football Alliance championship honours with Croydon Common in 1912-13
Gained Southern League Division 2 championship honours with Croydon Common in 1913-14
War service curtailed his career as a Robin
Appeared in wartime matches for Southampton between 1916 and 1919; however, he was in London for Christmas 1918 and so guested for Queens Park Rangers in the 1-1 draw at home to Tottenham Hotspur on Christmas Day 1918 and in the 0-0 away draw in the return the following day
Was recruited into the Army Ordnance Corps as a Private under age and paid as a boy until he reached the age of 18
Served 13 years 120 days rising to Lance Corporal before going back to Private when retained until 31.3.1920 on Home Service with the 20th Batt. London Regiment
His Army record records him as having a fresh complexion, blue eyes and red hair
Played for the Royal West Kent Regiment at centre half

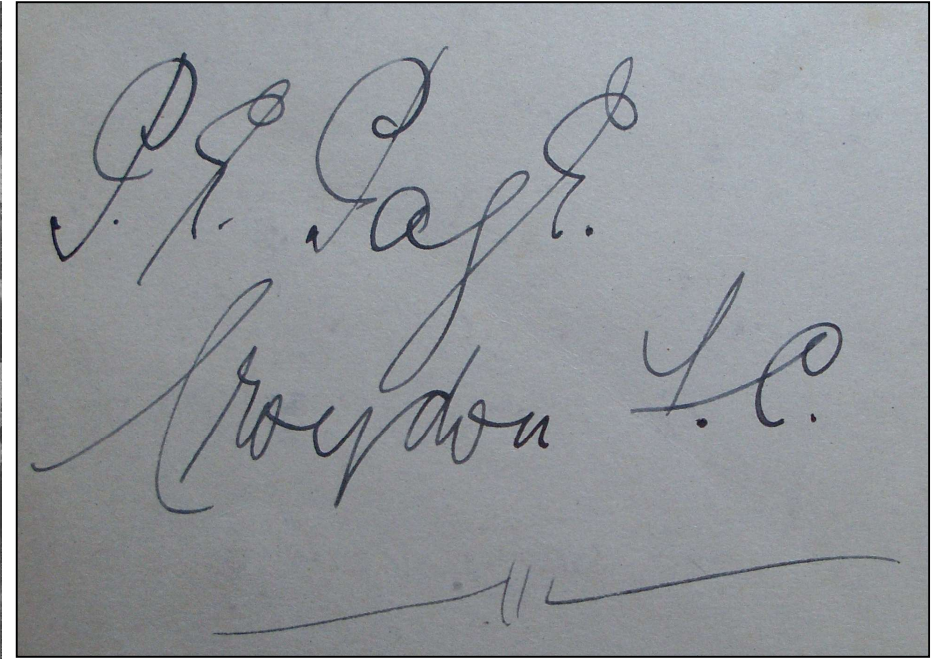
Southampton record him asking for a transfer to shipbuilder Harland & Wolf in 1919, but he signed for another shipbuilder, Thornycroft, and he re-signed there on 20.08.1920

He married Gladys Evelyn Thrift (1895-1982) in Southampton in 1919

One of ten children, he sadly lost three brothers in France in WW1
