Some sources suggest that he died in Wigan in 1933, but this would give an error of 2 years on his age at death

Was a platelayer by trade

The 1891 Census shows him as a joiner's apprentice living at 7 Alpine Terrace, Kearsley, Bolton with his father Samuel (48), a foundry fitter, his mother Dinah (47) and his siblings Jane (20), William (18), Elizabeth (16), Mary (11), Thomas (9), James (7), Joseph (5) and John (2)

The 1911 Census shows him as a professional athlete living at 55 Muriel Road, Norwich with his wife Alice (32) and daughters Lily (8) and Alice (4)

Appeared for Croydon Common in 1 minor cup match, without scoring

Jointly held the Croydon Common record for F.A. Cup appearances in a season (10)

His first England cap was gained in a side which also contained fellow future Commoner William Balmer

Played twice for The North v. The South and played for the Football League v. Scottish League

Was coaching the North German Football Federation representative XI in Germany in 1914 and so was interned at the Ruhleben camp along with many other professional footballers, including England legend Steve Bloomer

In November 1914, he refereed a Ruhleben match between "Tottenham Hotspur" and "Oldham Athletic"

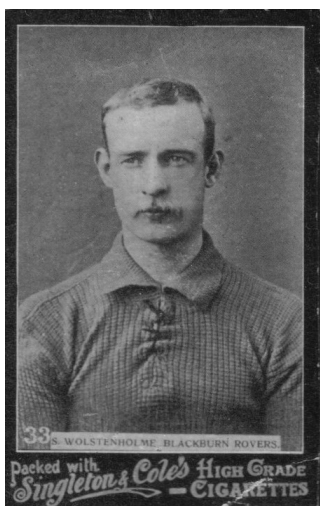
For a while, the Commonwealth War Graves Commission website erroneously recorded another Sam Wolstenholme, killed in 1915, as "a football international"

His brother TOM played for Blackpool, Bolton Wanderers, Burnley and Bradford Park Avenue

As nimble as a squirrel a player who understands football and knows how to play it



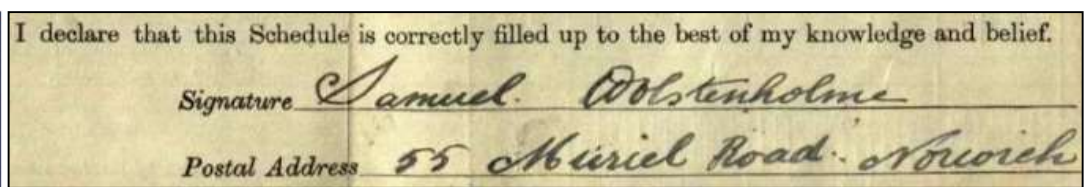

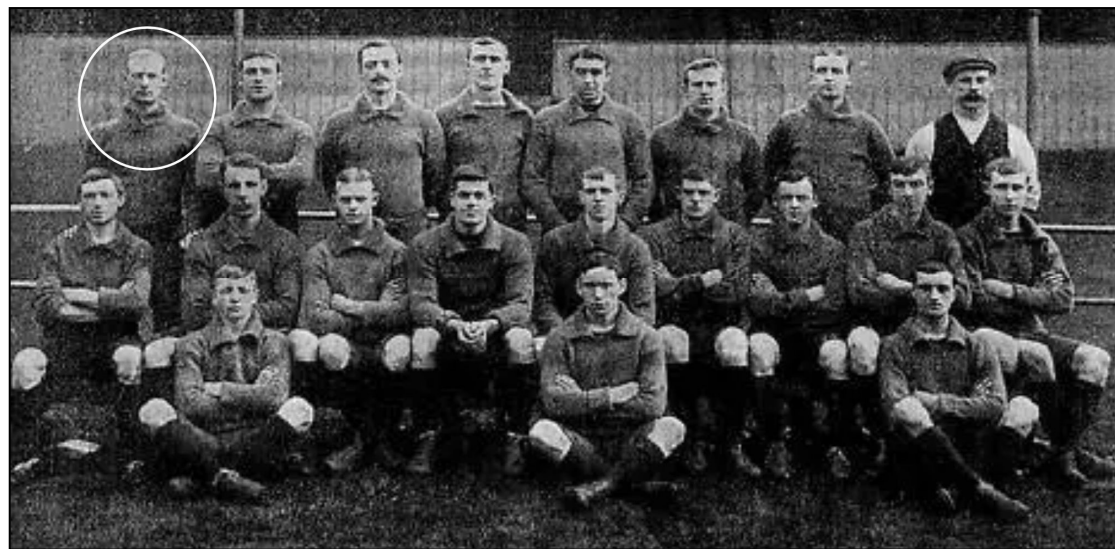

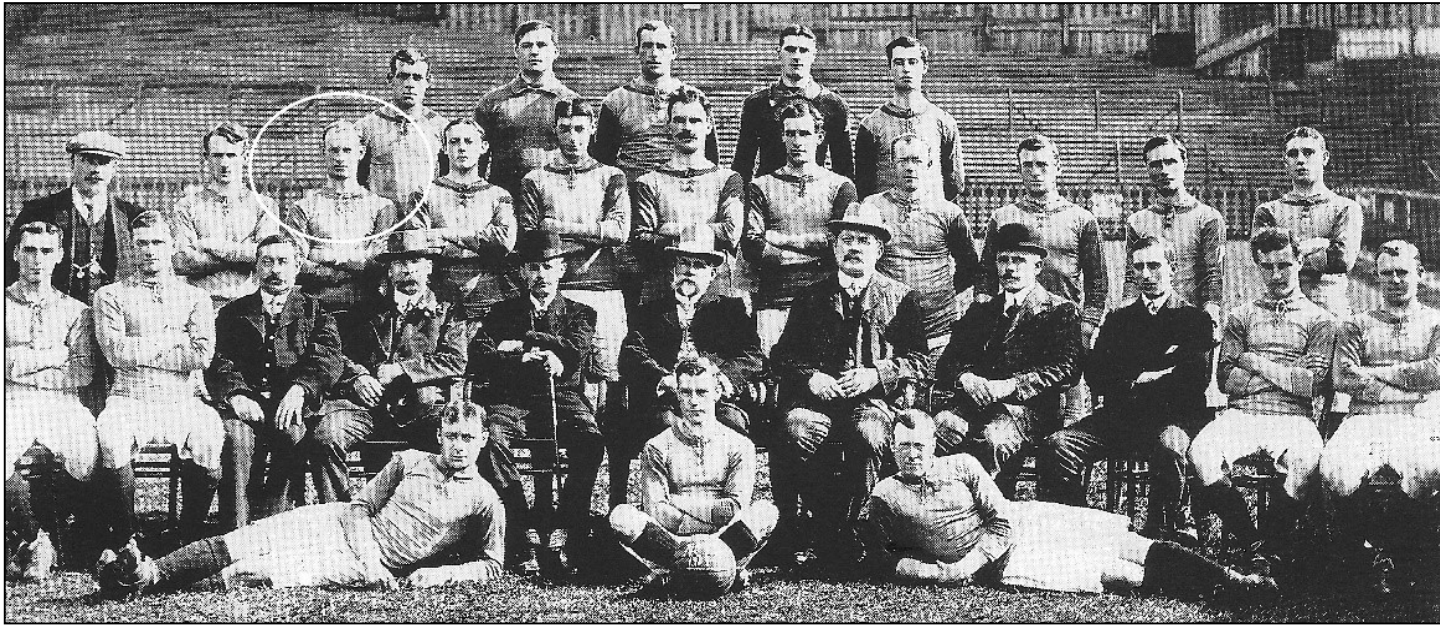

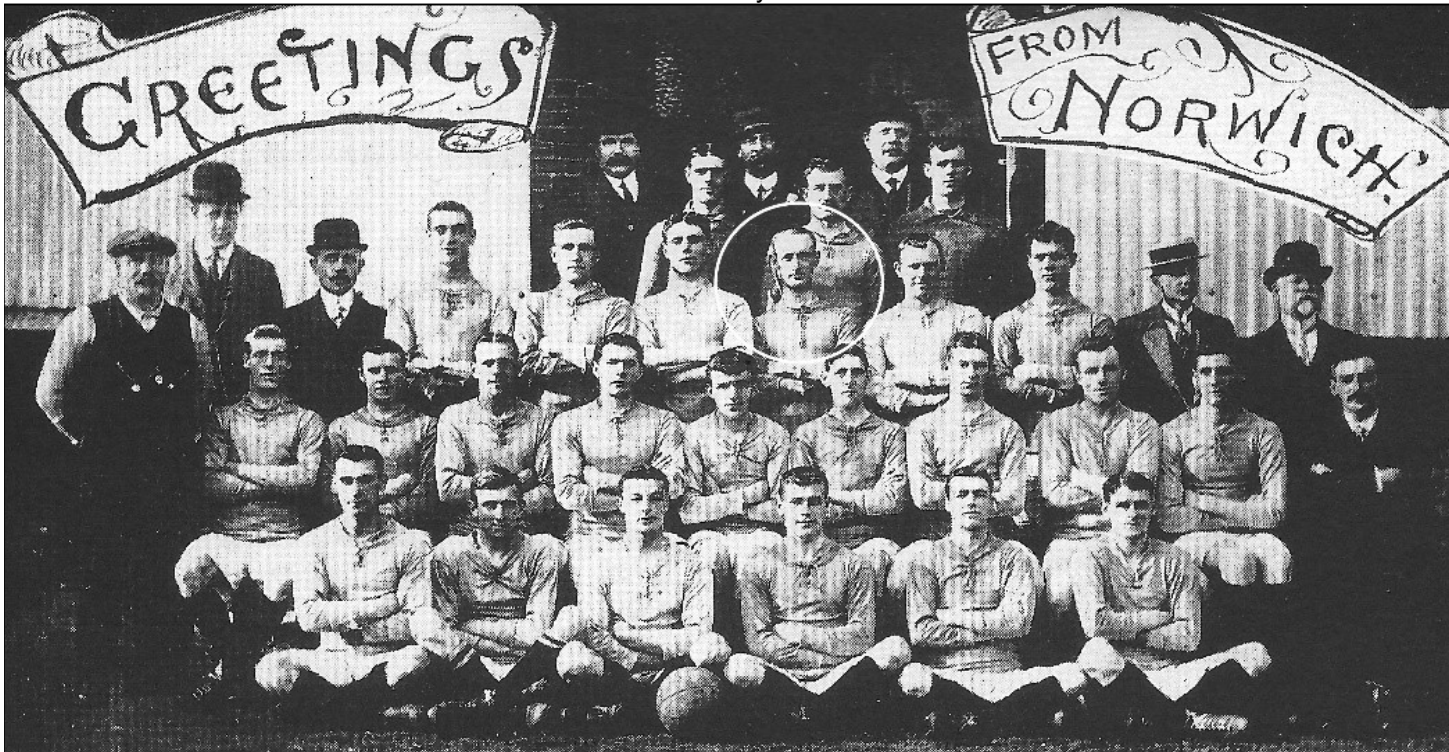

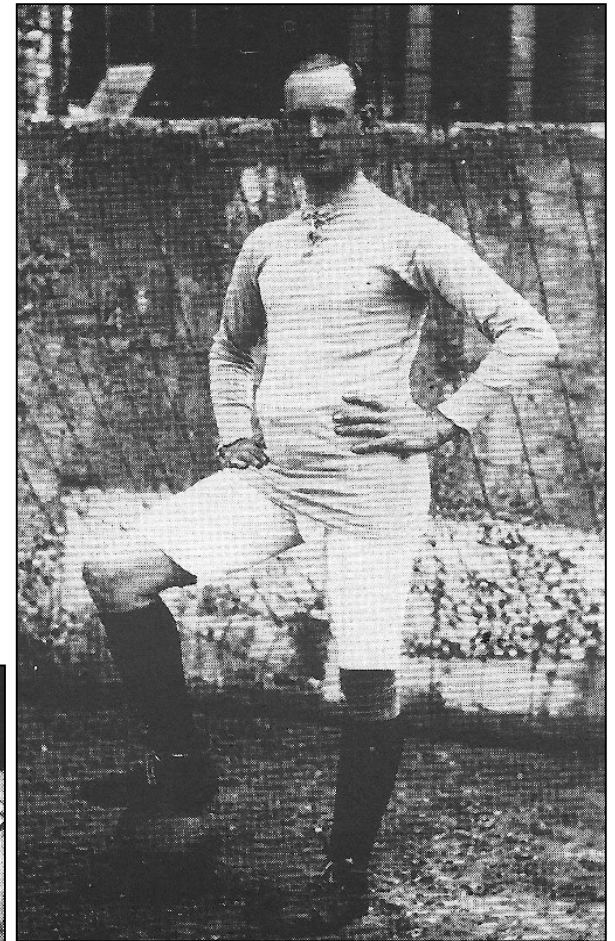

Sam Wolstenholme

Sam Wolstenholme was recorded as a member of the Ruhleben Lancastrian Society in the Manchester Guardian of January 15th 1915 (p.12). The article is entitled "Interned in Germany: Lancashire's Civilian Prisoners: Full List of Those Detained at Ruhleben". His address was recorded as 1 Cemetery Road, Farnworth.

Wolstenholme, interned in Barrack 9, and "late of Everton", was referred to in an article on April 21st 1915 in the Scotsman entitled "Football Among War Prisoners in Germany", where it was noted that he had refereed the final in a football tournament held in November 1914 at the Ruhleben camp.

He was also noted in the Times of April 20th 1915 (p.5, col B) as having refereed a cup tie in November 1914 at the camp. He is described in this article as being lately of Everton Football Club.

Wolstenholme is then noted as playing on the England side, led by Steve Bloomer, in a mock international between England and the Rest of the World on May 2nd 1915. Kick off took place at 4.30pm, and a document with the teams listed was recently discovered amongst some Foreign Office files by the National Archives, in November 2005.

He was also named in an article in the Manchester Guardian of August 19th 1915 (p.6) as having participated in a Lincolnshire versus Yorkshire cricket match at Ruhleben.

Wolstenholme was described in the Scotsman newspaper of January 10th 1916 (p.10) as being a professional footballer interned at Ruhleben.

Wolstenholme was further noted in the second issue of the Ruhleben Camp Magazine (April 1916, p. 29) as having been a member of a football team led by John Cameron, which defeated an opposing side led by Steve Bloomer on March 3rd 1916.

Wolstenholme is further recorded in the fourth issue of the Ruhleben Camp Magazine (August 1916, p.37) as playing cricket for the Barrack 9 side.

WOLSTENHOLME AT RUHLEBEN

The camp newspaper records that:

Football

- * On 28 March 1915, he played centre half for Ruhleben v. The Rest
- * On 2 May 1915, he played centre half for "England" v. The Rest
- * On 3 March 1916, he played for John Cameron's side in a 4-3 win over Steve Bloomer's side, with the newspaper recording that he was "as usual a tower of strength and cleverness"

Cricket

- * On 23 July 1916, he took 5 wickets for just 20 runs for "Lancashire" in the Roses cricket match with "Yorkshire", but in a losing cause
- * Later that summer, he scored 24 runs off the the final six balls of the match to help his Barrack 9 cricket team beat Barrack 4
